personal from the president

2015 Report

This is my first "Personal From the President" of the new calendar year. Each month my *One Accord* column is written two weeks before the first day of the next month. It was around Dec. 15 that I wrote my January column. Here we are in the middle of January, and I am writing my February column.

The Church of God, a Worldwide Association, operates on a fiscal year that begins Jan. 1 and ends Dec. 31. The 2015 year-end reports are now available, and we know that it was a very good year in all areas—finances, Church attendance, new contacts, unique visitors to Life, Hope & Truth

We all know that statistics can be used in many different ways, often to make one's case without being completely accurate. You see it all the time in politics. President Obama quotes statistics to prove that the economy is great. Republicans quote statistics to prove that the economy is falling apart. Which is correct? Probably both have a degree of accuracy, but each has a spin or a bias.

George Canning, an English politician from the early 19th century said this about statistics: "I can prove anything by statistics, except the truth." The 20th-century American crime writer Rex Stout wrote, "There are two kinds of statistics, the kind you look up and the kind you make up."

Back in December we launched a new publication here in the office called the "President's Report" for the purpose of reporting *accurate* statistics. It is different from anything we have done before and is only circulated within the office and shared with the Ministerial Board of Directors. My goal in this new publication is to provide these statistics on a monthly basis for use in publications, articles, etc., and my desire is that we all use the most accurate information we have available. While it is easy to promote good news, we also must be willing to share the not-so-good news. Whichever is the case, it must always be accurate.

In the January "President's Report" we published a number of end-of-the-year statistics from 2015 and compared them to 2014. Here are a few that I want to share with you.

- Total unique visitors to Life, Hope & Truth in 2014: 2,600,725.
- Total unique visitors to Life, Hope & Truth in 2015: 8,405,179 (223 percent increase).
- Total page views for Life, Hope & Truth in 2014: 5,390,081.

• Total page views for Life, Hope & Truth in 2015: 17,170,529 (218 percent increase).

But Media wasn't alone. Ministerial Services recorded statistics that were also very encouraging. There were no 200 percent increases like the ones we saw in Media, but the improvement was solid.

- Total new contacts (individuals who found us on the Internet and made contact with a local pastor) was our highest ever at 335 for 11 months. That is approximately one new contact every day.
- Our church attendance in the United States was 5,813. These are people listed in our database as attending services, including shut-ins and those on a webcast. Our highest actual attendance was 5,147.
- International attendance is 4,600. When added to the U.S. numbers, we have a worldwide attendance of approximately 10,400. Some of the internationals are isolated families or single members who are unable to attend a local congregation.

In the financial area, our income showed a very nice gain over 2014 and was 7 percent above budget at the end of 2015. In addition, we finished the year right on budget for expenditures.

God truly blessed us in 2015! I hope you find these statistics as encouraging as I do, but we must be sure that we give God the thanks. Paul said it this way: "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6).

Please pray that during the 2016 fiscal year we will be able to do even more, never forgetting to give God thanks for what He has already done.

Chile Youth Camp

oung people from Chile, Argentina and Peru, as well as two young people from Germany and the United States, traveled to San Fabian de Alico, Chile, for summer camp. On the hot Sunday afternoon of Dec. 27, a total of 109 people, including 90 campers, arrived at the campsite. The campsite itself was a familiar one to the campers and staff, as this was the fourth consecutive year that the camp was held in the small but fully equipped boarding school in the mountains of the southern countryside of Chile. After settling into their dorms, receiving general camp instructions and being organized into their team groups, the 2015-2016 summer youth camp officially got underway.

Monday morning marked the start of the official camp activities. As in years past, each day was filled with a number of similar and special activities. Each day started off with breakfast, followed by a Bible study given by the camp director and pastor of Chile, Saul Langarica, and other staff members selected to assist with the youth camp.

After the daily Bible study, the campers were given the opportunity to discuss assigned biblical questions within their team groups during the Christian Living sessions. The discussions were led by the youth team captains and supported by the attending staff members. The group discussions were followed by presentations from each group on the assigned topics. After each Christian Living session, campers presented short speeches. Each day, a few brave campers had the opportunity to address the entire camp on a topic of their choosing. Topics included personal stories, life lessons, Bible topics and reflections on past experiences.

This year's mini conferences were exceptionally well done and inspiring for all those who had the opportunity to listen. This year's camp was filled with a number of entertaining activities. Each day, the four teams of campers played volleyball and soccer games. There was even an all-star volleyball game played between the camp staff and the most skilled campers, with the campers taking the victory this year!

Campers also played group games and activities, such as dodgeball and archery.

On a few occasions the campers had the opportunity to go hiking and then swimming in the Nuble River, which runs through the beautiful landscape of the San Fabian region. Each day ended with a special activity for the entire camp. The campers and staff alike enjoyed a bonfire, a group chocolate-eating competition, a karaoke night, a youth dance, a movie night and a talent show night during the weeklong camp.

An underlying theme connects the physical activities of the camp environment in Chile with the spiritual lessons of the Christian path that camp teaches our young people. This year's camp theme was "Building Upon the Rock." All of the Bible studies and Christian Living sessions and a number of the mini conferences focused on the instructions given to us in Ephesians 2:20-22. The campers were encouraged to focus on building their spiritual house upon four important spiritual elements:

- 1. Jesus Christ as our cornerstone.
- 2. The teachings of the ministry of God's Church as our foundation.
- 3. Spiritual characteristics like the fruit of the Spirit as our materials.
- 4. A heart like that of King David, one committed to God and His will.

The 2015-2016 summer youth camp in Chile provided the campers with a week full of spiritual instruction and physical fun. With the four elements of spiritual construction as the guide for the construction of our spiritual house, the campers were given the necessary tools to continue developing the God-like character our Lord has called each and every one of us to have. While the physical fun of camp has ended

for this year, we hope that the spiritual lessons learned during the week will stay with the campers throughout the rest of their lives. ©©

FOUR BUILDERS IN THE HASHEMITE KINGDOM OF JORDAN

At the invitation of the royal family, these four volunteers continue a legacy of service and volunteer work in Jordan that began for the Church of God in 1982.

n August of 2015, four young adults—Johnathan Armstrong, Elyse Ashcraft, Crystal Bradley and Zach Cartwright—left the United States for a new experience immersed in the culture of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan. At the invitation and sponsorship of the royal family, these volunteers continue a legacy of service and volunteer work in Jordan that began for the Church of God in 1982. Since the inception of the project, we have sent 181 volunteers to Jordan. Since the Church of God, a Worldwide Association, was founded in 2011, we have already sponsored 15 young adults to carry on this legacy.

Starting with our current volunteer group, we have implemented a new, unique leadership development program. Participants in the FOI Leadership Fellowship, led by former volunteer and life coach Leslie Bosserman, go through various training modules (see sidebar). So far, this program has been a success, and we look to improve it with each subsequent project year.

Why would a young adult take on a big commitment such as this? As all former volunteers will tell you, the experience offers incredible international experience, unique cultural immersion and tremendous opportunities for travel. All of these help paint an incredible mosaic of lifetime experiences and look great on a resume! But more important, volunteering in Jordan provides the opportunity to carry on a legacy of Christian service, a legacy of representing the Church and a legacy of representing the tremendous future of the Kingdom of God. For that reason, we have named the current group of volunteers "The Four Builders." They are a group of young pilgrims and sojourners building on this incredible legacy in the Church. They are doing a wonderful job of building, thanks to God's gracious blessing and help!



 Ongoing coaching and accountability around goals and opportunities for reflection, strengths identification and development, emotional intelligence, energy management and perspective taking, among others.
- Capstone Project
 Culminating project where fellows design, create and implement something of value in their project sites.

Our four leadership fellows are learning about topics such as character-based leadership, core values and strengths development, group and team dynamics, among other leadership areas. Ultimately, this experience aims to develop the next generation of purpose-centered leaders who are dedicated to making a difference in the Church, the world around them and the Kingdom of God. I don't have a question, but I want to comment. Matthew 24:15 says, "When you see the 'abomination of desolation,' spoken of by Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place (whoever reads, let him understand), then let those who are in Judea flee to the mountains." "You" meant those Jesus was speaking to. It does not mean us 2,000 years later. And it doesn't mean people at any other point in time.

We appreciate the fact that you are thinking critically (by which, we mean analytically) when you read the Bible as well as our website material. We would like to respond. We readily understand your point, that when Jesus said, "Therefore when you see the 'abomination of desolation," He was speaking directly to His disciples.

But we respectfully disagree with your conclusion that His words have no application for anyone else. Before explaining further, let's establish that our purpose in responding is purely for information, not for argument or debate. We are responding to your critical thinking with critical thinking! In order to understand any part of the Bible accurately, we have to read it in context.

Daniel wrote of the abomination of desolation in three separate areas of his prophecy, but he never wrote the words, "Whoever reads, let him understand." So, Matthew wasn't quoting that sentence from Daniel. That means that God inspired Matthew to add it. Why? Why not reveal the meaning only to the people who would literally see "the abomination of desolation"? There can be only one reason: Jesus' words are directed to every believer throughout history. The purpose for doing that lies in discerning the effect the words would have on every believer down through the ages.

That is, the warning would inspire every reader to be alert to the fulfillment of the prophecy and to remain spiritually vigilant, always prepared for Christ's return. Clearly, Matthew 24:15 means it is important to understand the abomination of desolation. Even more important are the additional benefits that have come to everyone who took this prophecy personally. Jesus masterfully stirred every Christian throughout the centuries by the few words of this verse.

We noticed that you wrote this comment to us from our article "Daniel the Prophet." Look again at the next to last paragraph of the article:

"Even though Daniel prophesied during the early part of the sixth century B.C., his prophecies were sealed until the end time. Similar to the instruction he had received to 'seal up' a vision he had been given earlier (Daniel 8:26), Daniel was again told, 'But you, Daniel, shut up the words, and seal the book until the time of the end; many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall increase' (Daniel 12:4)."

Daniel leaves no doubt that the prophecy is genuinely for the end time. This verifies what we wrote above: The prophecy about the abomination of desolation was not just for Daniel. It also verifies that the prophecy wasn't only for the disciples who literally heard Jesus say, "When you see."

(You can read about the various fulfillments of this prophecy in our article "Abomination of Desolation: What Is It?")

In conclusion, this concerns more than just Matthew 24:15. If readers of the Bible used the approach that your comments suggest, Scripture would be only a book of history. It is that, but so much more. It is the dynamic, living Word of God, applicable to all people throughout the ages.

MEET THE **MINISTER**



hil Sandilands grew up in the Church of God after his grandmother was first called in 1961. She passed an issue of *The Plain Truth* magazine to his mother, and they began attending in 1967 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

He received his undergraduate degree in theology from Ambassador College and his MBA from the University of Dallas in telecommunications management. When he was a junior at Ambassador College in May of 1980, Mr. Sandilands began working with Fred Gilreath, the manager of telecommunications in Pasadena. He continued working for the college until December of 1989 when he was transferred to Big Sandy, Texas, to work on the phone system there. That was the year of the big consolidation and building projects.

In 1995, when the doctrinal changes were introduced in the Worldwide Church of God, Mr. Sandilands resigned from Ambassador College and went to Dallas where he continued to work in telecommunications.

He was ordained an elder on Jan. 31, 2009, and hired as a full-time pastor in 2013. He now serves as the pastor for the New Orleans, Louisiana, and Laurel, Mississippi, congregations. He and his wife, Marlys, have two grown children, Emily Prince and Justin Sandilands.

Q: Why did you want to work for the Church?

A: The real question is, "Why did I want to work again for the Church?" After working for the college for 15 years, it was one of the saddest days of my life when I resigned from the college. Both Marlys and I had worked for either the Church or college since we attended Ambassador, and going from that environment to corporate America was a hard step. I had always dreamed of getting back to working for the Church.

Q: What did you look forward to most about becoming a pastor in the Church?

A: Getting back to working full-time with the people of God! What a joy to be able to see and interact with people of like mind. There can't be a better job on the planet than working with the Church of God!

Q: What goals do you have for your congregation?

A: My biggest desire is twofold: First, to see the personal growth and stability in the people who have already been called and constitute the church areas I pastor. To get growth, we need stable local congregations. While waiting for future growth, we will be working on stability.

Second, to see the growth that God brings to the Church. I see the potential rising to the surface; and if God provides the calling, I plan on being very busy as more people start to contact us!

Q: What personal experience do you feel most prepared you for your new responsibility?

A: This would also be a twofold

answer. First was the opportunity to work in the Dallas church area. This is a vibrant and large area where I was able to get involved in many local programs that helped prepare me for whatever responsibilities might be presented in a local congregation. We had teen, young adult and leadership programs running all the time. What tremendous exposure Marlys and I had!

Second, working in corporate
America also has given me a
perspective that is perhaps different
from the majority of the pastoral
ministry. Not better, just different.
I feel that this exposure has given
me an insight into the world's
system that allows me to share
with others the perspective of
working in a world while not being
a part of it. It has also allowed me
to work closely with the Church
administration with the training and
management experience I had while
in telecommunications.

Q: Can you name a person who has had a tremendous impact on you as a leader? Maybe someone who has been a mentor to you? How did this person impact your life?

A: My personal mentor was Doug Horchak. As the pastor of the Dallas congregation, for years he helped develop me in local leadership roles that eventually led to my ordination as a deacon and then as an elder.

With all of the rough edges I had as a person, he patiently chipped away at me until I was somewhat usable in the local area. He continued to believe in both Marlys and me when we sometimes doubted ourselves.


















Q: What is one characteristic that you believe every leader should possess? Why?

A: This list would have to be a long one, but I must choose one. Let me answer this from the perspective of a new pastor—patience. I once heard a business leader tell his staff that we were not in a sprint but a marathon. That is also true of us as Christians—and as leaders. We get baptized and want Christ to return immediately, but then we discover that we are in a long race not a dash!

As leaders, we must slow our people down to see the Kingdom of God and work on living this life while growing toward that goal. I must have patience, and I must also teach patience. A leader

must come to realize that he is both leader and pupil. Once a leader feels he has reached the pinnacle of character development, he ceases to be a good leader.

Q: What do you feel is the biggest challenge facing the Church today?

A: The same challenge since A.D. 31—Satan! He changes his methodology, but the design is the same. He wants people to take their focus off of the goal of the Kingdom of God and become myopic on the issues of today.

Q: What are you currently reading?

A: One Voice, Two Lives by cantor David S. Wisnia. It's the story of a Polish native during WWII who went from being an

Auschwitz prisoner to working with the 101st Airborne troopers.

Q: What are your hobbies and interests?

A: Interests change over the years. Today it is being a grandfather! I also have had a passion for playing the guitar since I was 15. I love to study history—a passion that I didn't have while at Ambassador College, which I now regret since I was surrounded by so many knowledgeable people.

Q: What do you think your spiritual gift is?

A: Perhaps teaching. I love to visualize sermons as I put them together and enjoy finding the flow that I think will catch the listener's interest. @@


