The Sabbath, an Island in Time

I cannot remember when I began keeping the Sabbath. In fact, I cannot remember when I *did not* keep the Sabbath. I was 2 years of age when my mother came into the knowledge of the Sabbath, which she embraced immediately. That was more than 65 years ago. The Sabbath has been a very important part of my life, and my understanding of its meaning has deepened over the years based on age and life experience.

When I was a child, we observed the Sabbath very strictly. We really had little that we could do on that day, since there was no church to attend. The closest congregation to our home in Arkansas was either Gladewater, Texas (400 miles away) or Chicago, Illinois (more than 500 miles away).

We kept the Sabbath at home. We had our meals together, my mother read to us from the Church's literature, and we would take a walk around the farm as the sun set. Even though I was a little boy with a tremendous amount of energy, it was easy to honor and respect the Sabbath because of the way my mother presented it to us.

As a teenager, I was able to attend services, which really took over our Sabbaths. No longer were they as restful and peaceful, but they were exciting and full of happiness. We had friends and other families in the Church to spend time with. We had afternoon services in Memphis, but we always arrived early, at least one hour before services. We left home around noon and normally did not return until 9 or 10 in the evening. Travel in the 1960s was different from what it's like today. We had few freeways, and even though the trip to Memphis was only 35 miles, it took more than an hour over busy two-lane highways.

After leaving Ambassador College as a young ministerial trainee (only 22 years of age), I married my wife, and we began a family. Our first daughter was born in 1975. My Sabbaths were now filled with Church work. While our children were growing up, I was a pastor in Georgia and New England. For many years, we traveled a circuit between two congregations every Sabbath. Our goal was always to have a Friday night family dinner to usher in the Sabbath.

For some time we took our three girls to both services each Sabbath, but soon we realized this wasn't really giving them the best Sabbath experience. The Sabbath was becoming more of a burden than a delight, so we started a practice of having them attend only one service. Since we lived between the two

congregations, we took them to the morning service and dropped them off at home for the afternoon. Or we left them at home in the morning and then picked them up for the second service. This also gave them an opportunity to spend quality time on the Sabbath with their mother.

Today our children are gone from the home, leaving my wife and me to celebrate the Sabbath by ourselves. We still try to get together with our family on Friday nights whenever we are in town. Sometimes I can attend services in Dallas without a speaking assignment, making for an especially restful Sabbath.

Years ago, I read a book titled *To Be a Jew* by Rabbi Hayim Halevy Donin. I have never forgotten the chapter he wrote on the Sabbath. He referred to the Sabbath as an "island in time." While he did not quote the New Testament, he really echoed the words of Jesus Christ: "The Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath" (Mark 2:27). God doesn't need a day of rest, but it is important for man.


As members of God's Church, we must never neglect the Sabbath (Exodus 20:8). Whether the Sabbath has been part of your life for many decades or you are fairly new to its observance, I encourage you to embrace it. And I hope that as you go through the various stages of life your appreciation for the Sabbath will grow only deeper. And as society gets more complex, we must constantly examine our conduct and how we observe this holy day that was established from creation. It is indeed like an island in time, an island of peace in the midst of a chaotic world.


Branson Presidents' Day Family Weekend



ow often do we think about honor? The Fifth Commandment comes to mind immediately for most of us.

At the annual Families Glorifying God

Who must we give honor to, and how do we do so?

After services, snacks were served. Once everyone had eaten, the young children participated in Sabbath school activities, while the teens and adults attended the seminars.

For the first seminar, the men and women met separately. Cory Erickson presented the men's seminar: "Honor in Our Manifest Roles." As Christian leaders, men should honor God,

first and foremost, but also the many diverse groups of people in the Body of Christ.

Pam Myers presented the women's seminar: "Building a Godly Reputation."

Everyone came back together for the second seminar, which included some interaction. It was presented by Gary Black and titled "The First Commandment With Promise." Showing honor to fathers and mothers is fundamental for any stable society. It is also vital in God's Church. We discussed how we can better honor our parents, whether we are young or old.


Following the seminars, a catered chicken dinner was served. For dessert, there were two cakes decorated with 1 Peter 2:17, our theme for the weekend.

Foundation Outreach International Advancing a World of Good

ccording to the National Center for Charitable Statistics (NCCS), there are more than 1½ million nonprofit organizations in the United States. This number includes churches, public charities, private foundations, universities and other types of registered nonprofit organizations.

NCCS reports that Americans are the most generous people in the world. According to givingusa.org, Americans contribute almost \$400 billion a year to charitable causes. They also volunteer in great numbers. Approximately 25 percent of those over the age of 16 volunteered through or for a charitable organization between 2010 and 2014.

Interestingly enough, religious organizations received the largest share of those donations and volunteer help. Approximately 32 percent of all donations go to churches. Educational institutions are a distant second with 15 percent, and human service organizations come in third with 12 percent.

I recall the day I learned about volunteerism and how important it is. Our family was asked to help clean and paint a widow's house. I was only 12, but I remember the joy our collective effort brought to that widow and the fun we had working together! Since then, I have volunteered for many service projects, charitable fund-raisers, and efforts to serve the needy. I know many of you also serve others in these ways. We are Christians. We follow the example and commands of God and Jesus Christ. He served and even paid the ultimate price for all of mankind in that spirit of service (John 15:13).

But some, when asked to volunteer for a service project or contribute to a charitable cause, will say, "I tithe. Isn't that enough?"

Is it? In Luke 17:10 we read what Christ said: "So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty'" (English Standard Version).

Have you ever found yourself wanting to do more—to go beyond what is commanded? Haven't we all seen the pictures of starving children, people displaced by natural disasters and war, or needy individuals who need help? Let's face it; anyone who has a heart wants to help. But too often the solution to those problems seems beyond what one person can do to make a difference. So, we often just try to put it out of our minds and go about our regular routine.

Of course, many of us do volunteer and support charities and service projects. We go above and beyond what is required of us. And, yes, we all still want to do more (Matthew 5:16; 1 Peter 2:11-12).



The vision for a charity

Decades ago, the Church of God saw the need to create a charitable organization that could do good works with contributions and volunteers from our membership and donors. The vision for this charity was to assist the members of the Church in helping other members and the world receive financial and humanitarian aid, without taking tithe funds that finance the primary work of the Church—preaching the gospel and caring for congregational needs. Donors would have confidence the money raised would not be spent on high administrative costs—salaries of highly paid CEOs, board members and employees.

The Church of God, a Worldwide Association, supports the charity we call Foundation Outreach International (FOI). The foundation is a separate and legal 501(c)(3) charity registered with the IRS. All the board members are unpaid volunteers, and contributions made to FOI are used for our projects. All of our volunteers freely give of their time and energy to support the foundation's projects.

FOI's international projects range from teaching children and members at camps to a 10-month teaching opportunity in schools in Amman, Jordan. These international projects provide opportunities for volunteers to not only assist and gain experience, but also give them exposure to international travel in developing countries. Some of the countries where we currently sponsor projects are Zimbabwe, Zambia, Malawi, Ghana, Nigeria, Kenya, Philippines, Jordan and Rwanda.

Our scholarship program assists needy students in attending vocational schools, colleges and universities all over the world. We recognize that education is an important key to lifelong success for deserving young people, especially in emerging economies.

We also sponsor programs like Hilltop Outreach and Embark, which involve hundreds of volunteers in service projects, charity fund-raisers and mentoring programs. (See foundationoutreachintl.org for more detailed information and applications.)

How can you help?

"How can I help?" several have asked. There are a number of ways you can help and be involved in FOI's projects. First, you can pray for the success of our projects and God's protection for our volunteers. Conditions can change quickly anywhere in the world, and we all know the best safeguard against unexpected and dangerous situations is God's protection. You can also pray for more donors for our programs.

Second, you can volunteer. Go to our website and see the many opportunities available. You can volunteer as an organizer or participant of a service project or fundraiser with Hilltop Outreach. You can volunteer to be a mentor (guide) for a high school student with Embark. Or you can volunteer for one of our international projects. Frankly, there is no age restriction for any of our projects, although we recognize that young adults often have more discretionary time during school breaks to help out with our international projects.

Third, you can contribute financially. Your donations are always welcome and are tax-deductible. Some of you may work for companies that match charitable giving. Check with your employer to see if your donations to FOI could be matched. In this way you can double what you give to our worthwhile projects!
