D-Day and Young People

June was a very busy month! Graduations, weddings, Father's Day, vacations and other special occasions filled the month. June also included an anniversary that went by mostly unnoticed. It was on June 6, 1944, that the Allied forces, under the leadership of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, stormed the beaches of Normandy. It was the largest sea invasion in history. On that first day 2,500 Allied soldiers died, and 8,500 were wounded. From D-Day through Aug. 21, a total of 2,052,299 soldiers stormed ashore, and 36,976 were killed along with 153,475 wounded and 19,221 missing in action. In addition, 16,174 airmen were killed when their planes were shot down.

These statistics are taken from *Never Say Goodbye* by Robert Anstey. In it he describes what it was like to be 19 and part of the Normandy landing forces. The author's father and namesake, Bob Anstey, came ashore on June 9 as a 19-year-old, responsible, along with a crew of 15 other men, for firing the big guns that were brought to Normandy to protect the airfields. The book describes the exhilaration their crew felt when they shot down their first fighter plane. But the exhilaration was short-lived when they realized they had actually killed the pilot. As one of the men declared—"we killed someone!" That sober thought was compounded when they pulled the body out of the plane and discovered that the pilot was a 16-year-old flying his first mission.

The entire crew grew quiet when they realized they had killed a teenager with his whole life in front of him. They also realized that this 16-year-old was part of the raid that had killed one of their crew members. It was hard to separate the emotions—the anger that one of their close friends was killed by a German pilot and the sadness that this 16-year-old was now dead, his future taken away.

The events that followed D-Day displayed some of the best in human courage and the worst in the loss of young lives. Between 50 and 80 million people died in World War II. The average age of the combatants was 26. Of course this is true of most wars. The declaration of war is made by older and "wiser" men and women, but the actual fighting is done by the young people.

When you look at the history of mankind, you see one tragic war after another. Since 1945, major wars have been fought in Korea, Vietnam, Kosovo, Kuwait, Afghanistan and Iraq, just to name a few. The combatants were mostly in their 20s.

The world is certainly better off without a Hitler-dominated Germany, but the victory by the Allied forces in World War II was only a temporary fix. Today we are closer to the total destruction of humanity than we were on that June day in 1944.

This issue of *One Accord* focuses on another group of young people, those graduating from high school and college. What does the future hold for them? Even though the world is growing darker and is more challenging than at any time in history, by choosing the right path, the narrow way (Matthew 7:13-14), we can be assured that God will take care of our young people.

Over the years I have read a number of books about the Normandy invasion. There is really nothing like it in history. It was the beginning of the end for Hitler, but it failed to solve the most basic problem of mankind—the rejection of God and His way of life. As Christians, we object to the use of war and killing to solve man's problems, but we know that man will continue down this wide and disastrous path until Jesus Christ returns to this earth.

Join me in congratulating our high school and college graduates. Join me in praying for their understanding of the real solution to man's problems. If they can grasp the significance of God in their lives at a young age, they indeed have a very bright future ahead. Solomon wrote in Ecclesiastes 12:1, "Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, before the difficult days come." Developing a relationship with God while you are still young is extremely important. Do it "before the difficult days come." That's good advice for all our graduates!



Edwin and Billie Jean Marris

On Feb. 20, 2016, one of God’s faithful servants, Billie Jean Marris, breathed her last breath, and her husband, Edwin, said good-bye to his partner of 64 years. Those years had seen them through chronic health issues. Billie Jean had suffered rheumatic fever and pneumonia during childhood, which caused heart damage and predictions of premature death (which she defied). Then there were relocations, the growing of a family and, ultimately, 31 years of service to God.

Edwin and Billie Jean’s friendship began in childhood and blossomed into a lifelong commitment. Her obituary summed it up: “The friendship of Edwin and Billie became a courtship, filled with long talks, walks through their small town, lots of laughter and several pints of ice cream. Ultimately this led to their marriage on Dec. 5, 1952, while Edwin was serving in the U.S. Navy.” Mr. Marris mused, “We were both 19-year-olds—young kids.”

A new enlistment

The obituary continued: “During the early years of their marriage, Edwin and Billie moved throughout the U.S. for three years with the Navy, then settled in Chicago in 1956.” It was there that they were introduced to the teachings of Herbert W. Armstrong and became members of the Radio Church of God.

Chicago, Illinois was also the birthplace of three of their four children: Edwin Jr., Michael and Jonathan. Their fourth, a daughter, Deborah, was born later in Mobile, Alabama. And it was in Chicago that God called Mr. Marris to His ministry. Mrs. Marris was right there at his side. Sometime around 1961 Mr. Marris was ordained a deacon, as longtime friend Larry Salyer recalled, serving in a growing congregation in Chicago.

The Marris were among 7,000 brethren, by one count, attending the Feast of Tabernacles in Big Sandy, Texas in 1963. Mr. Marris was one of nine men who were ordained as local elders by Herbert W. Armstrong on the Last Great Day. Soon after, the Marris found themselves in Meridian, Mississippi, where Mr. Marris was assigned to assist Arthur Craig, the minister there.

“Mr. [Gerald] Waterhouse had started a Bible study for the black brethren in Meridian on Sunday[s]. I had to visit them scattered throughout the south and report back to Mr. Craig,” Mr. Marris explained. Later, the couple moved to Mobile, Alabama, to serve an integrated congregation there.

In 1966 Mr. Marris attended a year at Ambassador College, and then it was back in the field to assist wherever he was sent. Eventually, in 1971, he arrived in Houston, Texas, as associate pastor to Mr. Salyer. Together they served that large congregation. When Mr. Salyer was transferred to Washington, D.C., Mr. Marris became the pastor.

A healing remembered

When asked whether he could share some inspiring examples that happened during his ministry, Mr. Marrs recalled a healing. It was during his year at Ambassador College, and he had anointing duty. "A guy came in and wanted me to anoint him because he had tuberculosis. The next Sabbath he came to me excitedly, and said that God had healed him instantly. That was encouraging to me because I was a little nervous going to Ambassador."

Matters of attitude

Over time Mr. Marrs developed his approach concerning the responsibility of working with people: "I was a petty officer second class in the Navy and had to supervise personnel. You run across all kinds of attitudes. The thing that stood out in my mind in working with God's people was their attitude and willingness to serve God. I could never be hard on them because of their attitude. They made mistakes, like we all do, but when push came to shove, when you show them God's way, they are willing to do it. That stands out in my mind more than anything. ... I always considered myself as an older brother—I never considered myself over them, or greater than them."

The biggest lesson we learned

"You may not have the desire to confront people with problems and things," Mr. Marrs reflected. "I found that when you practice God's way, it just works out. [Regarding] the things that I may be reluctant to handle, I look in the Bible, and God says, 'Do that.' I say, 'I've got to do that.' I start, and it's like God just opens a door, and it seems like things just work out. That has been an amazing thing to me. God's way just works. ... Some members have told me the same thing. 'Mr. Marrs, I was afraid to do certain things, but I just bit the bullet (or took the bull by the horns) and said I'm going to do things God's way.' It's like God aids you—He assists you, and things work out."

Fitting tributes

Arnold Hampton recalled, "Harold Jackson [the first black elder ordained in the Radio Church of God] was the 'father in the faith' for most of the blacks in the Church back in the early days. When Mr. Jackson married ... in 1978, of all the men he could have used to officiate, he chose Ed Marrs. That stamped the respect Ed Marrs had achieved by not only Mr. Jackson, but the rest of us in the ministry."

In looking back at the Marrs' record of faithful service, Mr. Salyer commented, "In the history of God's Church, both ancient and modern, there have been many heroes. I count Ed and Billie Marrs among them. At the time they entered Christ's ministry, the nation was fraught with racial tension as it sought to break free from centuries of segregation. Ed and Billie were willing to serve not only the black brethren, but to go into cities in the Deep South in which they still had to enter certain white homes through the back door and serve integrated congregations during some of the most frightening clashes of the civil rights movement. In their eulogies at Billie's funeral, the children made it clear that these were traumatic years. The Marrs long ago proved their sincerity when they said, 'God will work it out!' We can all learn lessons of humility and faith from their example." @A

After his wife's death, Mr. Marrs relocated to Colorado Springs, Colorado, and presently resides with his son Jonathan.



I don't know what to do about worshipping on the Sabbath, because all the churches in my area worship on Sunday. The nearest church to worship on Saturday is about three hours away each way. The church I go to right now is a good church—they teach right from the Bible, but on Sunday. Is that an acceptable alternative?

Because we interact mostly with people new to God's truth, some topics might not seem directly applicable to you. But think how you would answer the question if someone asked it of you! And many answers will contain spiritual principles that you can apply in your life, even if the question isn't one you would ask.

We are happy to help. Genesis tells us that by resting on the seventh day, God set it apart—distinguished it—from the other days of creation (Genesis 2:3). The Fourth Commandment adds the insight that His act made the day “holy” (Exodus 20:8). Holy means not only *set apart*, but *set apart for sacred use*.

More understanding is added in Leviticus 23:3: “Six days shall work be done, but the seventh day is a Sabbath of solemn rest, a holy convocation.” The convocation itself is also called holy. A convocation meant calling the community together for a meeting—obviously, in this case, for the purpose of worship. The Sabbath worship service is more than just a convenient meeting. It is convoked or called together on God's authority for sacred use, for worshipping Him.

Let's break this down further by considering the purpose for a worship service. It is an opportunity to come before God in a unique way, different from the way a believer privately comes before God in prayer. In a worship service, a person receives instruction and encouragement in God's way of life from His ministers. The worshipper sings praises to God and can fellowship with people of like mind.

Now the answer to your question becomes clear. Sunday worship would not be “before God,” because His presence is in the Sabbath, not Sunday. Sunday-observing clergy can have some biblical values, but that isn't the same as understanding God's Word. A true minister of God would lead worship only on the seventh day. The best others could offer would be a mixture of truth and error.

The same is true about hymns sung in churches that do not understand the Sabbath. It is just as important to sing the truth as it is to speak it! And, while you might have amiable conversations with Sunday worshippers, genuine *fellowship* with people of like-minded spiritual understanding isn't possible.

Even before considering other matters, the fact that God makes the Sabbath *and* the worship service on it holy means that Sunday worship isn't an acceptable alternative to Sabbath worship.

There are other factors to weigh, because God's true Church must be faithful to the entire Word of God. Even some churches that worship on the seventh day do not grasp other biblical truths. You want to find the Church that Jesus built, which He promised would never die out (Matthew 16:18). 



She learned about the Church in 1960 from her brother, William


